# Transitional Year Residency Program

## ACGME Approved with Osteopathic Recognition

With nine positions, the Transitional Year Residency (TYR) Program is approved for meeting the PGY-1 requirements of ACGME Residency Programs including Diagnostic Radiology, Preventive/Occupational Medicine, Anesthesiology, Psychiatry, Neurology, Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation (PM&R), Dermatology and Radiation Oncology. It can also be utilized as a stand alone year for those who are seeking extra clinical training, but have not yet decided on a specialty to pursue in future residency training. Osteopathic trainees will also get credit for completing an ACGME accredited Osteopathic Recognized Year, as we have achieved ACGME Osteopathic Recognition status, effective July 1, 2016.
